#### OUR NATIONAL ANTHEM

Our beloved national anthem was written in 1856 by Evan and John James from Pontypridd, but it was not until 1866 at the National Eisteddfod at Chester that it was adopted as such. Attending that event was the noted English poet, Matthew Arnold who was moved by the passion with which it was sung, that he remarked: 'when I see the enthusiasm these Eisteddfodds [sic] awaken in your whole people......I am filled with admiration.'

#### A WELSH FIRST

The first self-propelled locomotive ever to run on rails was built by Richard Trevithick and demonstrated over 9 miles with a 10-ton load and 70 passengers in Penydarren, Glamorgan, Wales, on Feb 21,1804.

#### NATIONAL EISTEDDFOD

The first **National** Eisteddfod was held in **Aberdare** in 1861. However, smaller local eisteddfodau had been in existence since earlier times—called almanac eisteddfodau. Formal eisteddfodau were held after 1789 and were the beginnings of an expression of popular culture unsurpassed anywhere in Europe.

#### Obituary

We were saddened to learn of the demise of Mrs. Olive David on March 3, 1997. Born in LLanelli, she emigrated to Canada with her family when she was around 10 years old, and settled in Bangor, Saskatchewan in 1920. The family re-located to Vancouver in 1929.

Mrs. David enlisted in the RCAF during World War 2 and served in Canada.

She was an honorary life member of the Welsh Society of Vancouver, and a faithful and generous member of its W.A. section; and also a frequent attendee at the Welsh Sunday service until she was stricken by chronic ill-health during her latter years. Olive was present at the opening of our Cambrian Hall. We mourn her passing and honour her memory.

#### MAELGWN MALE VOICE CHOIR

This choir, which is making its North American debut at the Tenth Avenue Alliance Church, Vancouver on March 18 next, was formed in 1970. They have already given over 900 concerts in the U.K., the Netherlands, Germany and Ireland, and they were the first Welsh male voice choir to give a concert tour of Israel and Greece. A number of radio programmes have been recorded for the BBC as well as several televised programmes from the cathedrals of Bangor, Chester and Liverpool. They have also hosted two Canadian choirs—one from Cornwall, Ontario and the other from Quebec.

## Welsh Patagonian Charles Lewis Evans to celebrate 105th Birthda March 30 ,1997

Born 30th March,1892 in Chubut, Patagonia, Republica Argentina the son of Thomas Lewis Evans of Menai Bridge, North Wales and Catherine Davies. (Thomas left for Chubut as a very young man from South Wales.) Charles was 9 when he left Argentina with his parents and settled in Bangor, Sasketchewan. Charles and Vi Olsen were married in 1949 in Vancouver and had 3 children. Vi passed away in 1991 and Charles has been retired happily in a seniors' residence with frequent visits from family and many many relatives within driving distances.

In 1992, relatives from Ontario, Manitoba, the Western Provinces and the Lower Mainland had a celebration for his 100th birthday with about 90 people gathering in a New Westminster-Coquitlam community hall, including many who had grown up with Charles in Bangor, Sask.

His daughter, Cathy, reports that he seems to be in reasonably good health and that he was out fishing with friends last summer.

A Welsh Tea (te bach) is planned for March 30th at his residence's reception hall to celebrate his 105th birthday.

#### A SNIPPET OF WELSH HISTORY

In 1883 Lewis Jones and Love Jones-Parry visited Argentina to explore the feasibility of establishing there a Welsh settlement . In Buenos Aires, Guillermo Rawson, the Minister of the Interior, offered them a tract of land and promised that Y Wladfa Gymreig (The Welsh Colony) would be recognized as one of the states of Argentina when its population reached twenty thousand. This promise was not ratified by the Congress of Argentina because of the fears that the British would use the presence of the Welsh as an excuse to seize Patagonia, as they had seized the Malvinas (the Falkland Islands) in 1833.



THE FIRST DAY OF April 1996 saw the map of local government in Wales changed again, a mere twenty two years after the reorganisation in 1974.

Local government as we know it today in Wales, where salaried officers serve councils composed of directly elected councillors, dates back only just over a hundred years. In 1888 the thirteen 'historic' counties of Wales, which dated back to the Middle Ages, became directly elected bodies. Eight years later other more local non-elected bodies were replaced by a patchwork of municipal boroughs, urban districts and rural districts, all with their own councillors and officers.

This pattern lasted until 1974 when the now familiar pattern of eight 'county' councils and thirty seven 'district' (or 'borough') councils took over. Those in rural Wales had splendid Welsh names - Clwyd, Gwynedd, Dyfed and Powys; Monmouthshire was legally incorporated into Wales as 'Gwent', while populous Glamorgan was split into 'West', 'Mid' and 'South'. These county councils were responsible for functions such as education, social services, fire services, strategic planning, highways, civil defence and trading standards. The district/borough councils were responsible for more local functions such as local planning matters, environmental health, housing, parks and leisure facilities, refuse collection and disposal.

Based on the principles that the counties were too large and remote, the districts too small and under-resourced and that the public were confused as to whether their local county or district council was responsible for a specific function, all were swept away. They have been replaced by twenty-three "unitary" or 'all purpose' authorities. While old 'historic counties' such as Anglesey, Pembrokeshire, Carmarthenshire and Cardiganshire (now called by its even more historic Welsh name - Ceredigion) have been reinstated more or less as they were pre 1974, the socalled new Monmouthshire, Denbighshire and Flintshire are but shadows of their former size. Powys, comprising the former Montgomeryshire, Radnorshire and Breconshire, has the largest surface area, while most of Merionethshire was put with half of Caernarfonshire to form, "Caernarfonshire and Merionethshire', now mercifully renamed as 'Gwynedd'.

In industrial South Wales gerrymandering has linked the coastal dormitory villages south of Bridegend with Barry under the name 'Vale of Glamorgan'. The new Caerphilly straddles the historic Glamorgan/Gwent (Monmouthshire) border. Rhondda Cynon Taff is an amorphous mixture of once proud mining valleys. Neath Port Talbot stretches from Lower Brynaman in the north to Margam in the south. The former anthracite coalfield communities of west Wales are dispersed among four councils -Carmarthenshire, Swansea, Neath Port Talbot and Powys.

If the concept was unitary local government, their titles are all but uniform. The new councils may be entitled a 'county borough council', 'county council', 'city and county council', or just 'council'. Confusing? Yes, but their powers are all the same. As a result of local government reorganisation two important functions were lost to autonomous authorities - the fire service and the three national parks of Wales. The only authorities to come through unscathed were the multitude of community (and town) councils, which prior to 1974 were called parish councils.

The argument against an all-Wales elected body with legislative and, possibly, tax raising powers based on 'overgovernment' is now non-existent. Like Scotland, Wales has now only one principal tier of local government, whereas most of England retains the two-tier system. The only obstacle that now stands between Wales and its first ever directly elected all Wales body is the political will of the government after the forthcoming general election. Wales is not overgoverned, it merely lacks its own government.
