

# Recipes

Spring, our thoughts turn to more lighthearted repasts, such as salads and fruit dishes. Here, is a recipe taken from the Tastes of Wales cookbook by Gilli Davies (published by B.B.C. Books) and will no doubt surprise many readers who tend to think of Welsh cuisine as Lamb, Leeks, Rarebit and Cawl! Yet, the Welsh used to decorate their food with flowers long before it became fashionable in other parts of Europe. Marigold petals were sprinkled on soups and stews while rose and violet petals were used on sweets.

Lavendar Syllabub

4 fl. oz. 120 ml.) water

4 large heads lavendar

or 1 Tablespoon dried lavendar\*

4 oz. (100 g.) caster/berry sugar juice half lemon

12 fl. oz. (355 ml.) double cream

3 Tablespoons dry white wine

Boil the water and pour onto the lavendar; leave to infuse for 20 minutes.

Strain the lavendar water and pour into a small saucepan; add the sugar and bring the syrup to a boil. Continue boiling for 1 minute. Cool the syrup, pour into a deep bowl, then add the lemon juice and wine. Using a hand or rotary whisk, slowly add the cream to the wine mixture; continue to whisk hard until the mixture thickens to a soft peak.

Spoon into glasses and stand in a cool place until needed. (Choose a cool larder in preference to a fridge.)

Serve with plain crisp biscuits.

(Syllabub will keep for 2 - 3 days, although the cream and wine may begin

to separate.)

\*Dried Lavendar is available from Galloways Specialty Foods - Pacific Centre Mall or New Westminster.

The recipe below is from Elaine (Brooks) Thoma.

#### Picau Ar Y Maen/Welsh Cakes

1 lb. flour

4 oz. margarine

4 oz. currants

6 oz. sugar

1/2 teaspoon mixed spice

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 egg

A pinch of salt

2 Tablespoons milk

Sift the flour, baking powder and salt together. Rub in the fat and add the rest of the ingredients. Beat the egg lightly and add to dry ingredients, with enough milk to make a firm paste. Roll out onto a floured board to a 1/4 inch thickness. Cut into rounds with a 1 1/2" or 2" cookie cutter. Cook on a griddle for about 3 minutes each side, or until golden brown.

Cool and sprinkle with sugar.

Serve alone or with butter.

# FINALLY, SAVAGE'S WELSH BACKGROUND WORKS FOR HIM

For once, people aren't making derogatory remarks about John Savage's heritage. A perceived arrogance has made the premier a target for critics who have labelled him the Welsh Windbag.

[Recently], however, Savage was able to turn his Welsh-ness to his advantage with the announcement that fellow Welshman Terence Matthews has been convinced to bring his company, Newbridge Networks Corp. to Halifax, NS.

Both Matthews and Savage hail from the south Wales town of Newport. As the story goes, they hit it off when they met for the first time during the Team Canada trade mission to China.

It just so happens that Matthews' Kanata, Ontario based company, with \$800 million in sales last year, is also one of the fastest growing information technology firms in Canada.

Newbridge makes telecommunication equipment that manages digital links by transporting voice, information, fax and video among far-flung offices. The provincial government [of Nova Scotia] will invest \$10 million and Newbridge at least another \$10 million to open the centre for research and development of network management software.

The deal also calls for the creation of an affiliated company called Ironbridge. It will conduct research into development of "ruggedized" cellular equipment which can

operate in severe climates.

Newbridge executive vice-president James Avis, says there is a growing market for the ruggedized cellular telephone equipment, especially in developing nations where it is cheaper to install a cellular system than a traditional phone system employing telephone poles and copper wire.

The provincial government's contribution to the project will be repaid with a royalty over the next four years from Newbridge's worldwide sales of network management software, he says.

Newbridge signed a similar arrangement with the British Columbia government last fall and Avis says he wouldn't be surprised if fresh deals are negotiated in other provinces in the future.

Although Newbridge usually constructs buildings to house its businesses, the glut of space in metro [Halifax] means it's more efficient to move into existing facilities - most likely some place near Dalhousie University and the Technical University of Nova Scotia, which the company hopes to tap for the bulk of it's workforce.

Savage says the money to help fund the Newbridge project is probably one of the best bets the province has ever made. Few who really understand what information technology is all about would dispute that.

No doubt about it, Newbridge is on the cutting edge of information and technology. The government hopes Newbridge has broken the floodgates and other high-tech companies will recognise the benefits of coming to Nova Scotia. That remains to be seen.

One thing is certain, Savage's hometown advantage helped pick this plum, something that even supersalesman Premier Frank McKenna of New Brunswick couldn't counteract.
