

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David Ponting gave two performances - Friday, 16th and Saturday, 17th October 1992. Mr. Ponting was very happy and thrilled on the Friday evening to see students from Burnaby and North Vancouver Secondary Schools. While speaking to the students it was discovered that for many, "Dylan Thomas" was the first live professional performance they had seen. Thank you to the English teachers who were present with their students. Sincere thanks to David Ponting for his two performances at the Cambrian Hall; to Allan Jones for his fine critique of the Saturday night's performance and to the Friday and Saturday night audiences who supported the "Dylan Thomas" weekend.

The Following "Critique", is by Allan Jones, on David Ponting as "Dylan Thomas, The Man & The Myth".

A few years ago we almost had the late and great Emlyn Williams grace our stage at the Cambrian Hall. His voice echoed over the telephone from the Okanagan - our light and sound system were inadequate - it was not to be.

Since then our own Cambrian Players have produced "Under Milk Wood" and three years ago another professional actor at the Fringe Festival portrayed our beloved "Dylan".

Last Saturday evening (Oct. 17th.) - our stage was again honoured by the appearance of Mr. David Ponting who wrote and produced "Dylan Thomas, The Man & The Myth".

The relatively small audience was not dissapointed. Mr. Ponting's portrayal of Dylan Thomas ran the full gamut of emotions. We saw him transformed from Dylan the drunk, self pitying man to Dylan the very frightened - from the small boy to the bombastic show-off. I found Mr. Ponting's portrayal of Dylan highly effective - moving, humourous, pitying and pitiful. However, his reading of the poems were somewhat less effective. I certainly enjoyed light breaks - "Fernhill" - "The force that throughout the green fuse" and "Do not go gentle into that good night" - but found them declaimed a la Dylan - but I must confess that I never enjoyed Dylan reading his own poems - and since Mr. Ponting was in character, that was what he was trying to do.

Always when one's yardsticks are Richard Burton and Emlyn Williams - well that's a hard act to follow. His readings from the short stories however were spell binding. We truly heard old Jones cry, "Stop the bus, I've left my teeth on the mantlepiece" - and the reply - "Don't worry, you won't need them, you're not going to bite anyone" - we were in the charabanc with Mr. Weasie and his fellow travellers.

The stage props were simple but very effective and functional. I was particularly impressed by the way Mr. Ponting moved across the darkened stage instantaneously at the moment the lights were cut and with a sudden effortlessness transported the audience not only to location and time but also with more difficulty to character change and mood. Accolades must go for this to the stage manager and his team.

I was particularly impressed by the use of slides and soundtapes. It was interesting to hear and not only see Dylan but Catlyn, his wife; Florence, his mother and let us not forget poor John Brinin, the academic left to cradle and control Dylan in America, unsuccessfully. The magic spell Mr. Ponting wove was broken only once when the slides malfunctioned and rather than reset them I feel he would have retained the audience's illusion that Dylan was there on stage had he libbed and glossed over the error. He did not and for a few minutes we were not in the "White Horse Tavern" but back in the Cambrian Hall. The spell was momentarily broken - but David Ponting masterly gained control again. Once again we never heard the audience cough or wriggle - we were back in the palm of his hand. Mr. Ponting's knowledge of Dylan was apparent throughout. He obviously has studied and condensed the life and works into an effective coherent stage version melded not only with academic knowledge but with love of the man himself. In such a story what does one leave out - "A child's Christmas in Wales" -? Well one cannot have everything in one and a half hours. The few props he used were more than adequate when one saw the remarkable embodiment and uncanny resemblance to one of the

most remarkable lyricists, storytellers and poetic personalities of the twentieth century. All in all it was an excellent evening of first class entertainment, We were absorbed by the performance. It was moving to see Dylan the giant as fragile as all of humanity — one of us. The audience was attentive, silent and did not miss a tragic or funny line. For ninety minutes on Saturday night we were lost in myth. Thank you David — come back again, and to you Dylan — we never knew you had left us.

#### WELSH APPLE PUDDING WITH FROTHY ORANGE SAUCE

This is a perfect dessert for the cold weather. For the health conscious it is feather-light, rather like a souffle, but very tasty and warming.

- 1 lb (450 g) cooking apples, peeled cored and sliced,
- 4 tablespoons water
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 4 cloves
- 1 1/2 ounces (40 g) butter
- 2 ounces (50 g) all-purpose
  flour
- 3/4 pint (450 ml) milk
- 2 ounces (50 g) caster or berry sugar
- 2 eggs separated
- 1 teaspoon grated orange rind

For the sauce:

- 2 egg yolks (quite large in size)
- 2 ounces (50 g) soft brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons freshly squeezed orange juice

Pre-heat the oven to 375 oC (190 oF). Stew the apples in the water with the honey and cloves until tender. Take out the cloves and put the apples in a well-buttered ovenproof dish. In a small saucepan, melt the butter, stir in the flour and then the milk. Bring to the boil, stirring constantly. Cool slightly. Add sugar, egg yolks and orange rind. Whisk the egg whites until stiff and fold into the batter. Pour over the apples and bake for 45 50 minutes.

For the sauce, whisk the egg yolks and sugar together until thick and creamy pale. Put the bowl over a pan of gently simmering water, whisk in the orange juice and continue whisking until the sauce bulks up into a froth.

Serve immediately with the hot apple pudding.

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
