THE BEGINNINGS OF CORONEL SUAREZ RECALLED BY TWO HEROES: Evan Parry and Barbara Lloyd Byans

John Coslett Thomas came to Chubut with his parents in 1875. Ten years later he moved with his father-in-laws family, Thomas Morgan Jones, to Sauce Corto -presently Coronel Suarez- where for a number of years he shared the joys and griefs of the Welsh colonists who had settled there. On his return to Chubut, he worked for a while as a school teacher in Trelew. In 1902 he emigrated again with his family to Canada.

His memoirs were published posthumously in 1949, and 1950, in the Welsh newspaper, "Y Drafod" (The discussion). From these memoirs, we have chosen and translated extracts which refer to the time he lived in Coronel Suarez.

THE WELSH AND CORONEL SUAREZ

Of those who left the Welsh colony in Chubut some two years before I did, were some who went to try to sow wheat on land offered to them by a gentleman named Cassey. They did so at his expense, in case they did not want to buy the land which could be bought and owned under very favourable conditions.

Their efforts exceeded their expectations, and some wrote to friends in Chubut urging them to join them. Mr. Cassey was so pleased that he concluded an agreement with Lewis Jones requiring him to go to Wales to look for more immigrants for which he would pay Lewis Jones so much per person and would appoint him administrator of the settlement.

But the Welsh who were already in Curumalan didn't want Lewis Jones to control them and opposed him, resulting in the group going to Puerto Madryn to build the railway, from which Lewis Jones profited much more. But, of course, the group would have benefited much more if they had settled in Curumalan.

It was said that the authorities had offered these lands, which now belonged to Cassey, to Lewis Jones and Sir Love Jones Parry before the Welsh came to settle in Patagonia, but they refused the offer because there too many indians there and there was little hope of the Welsh being independent in any province under the direct influence of the central government.

But that was twenty years ago, and already there were no indians, who could interfere with people and communications, and trading opportunities had greatly improved.

A FAMILY DECIDES TO GO TO CURUMALAN

When this news arrived in the Welsh Colony in Chubut, Thomas Morgan Jones sent his son, Morgan, to see the place, and when he returned, the family decided to move to Curumalan, and as a member of the family (Caroline Jones) was engaged to me, and as I thought it was a better place to begin a new life, I went with them.

In order to 'burn their bridges' the family sold or gave away all that they had. The farm, along with the shares in the canal company, which brought them water, they sold for their face value, that is to say, sixty pounds sterling. This was a stupid thing to do, as some of the family returned later, and the sixty pounds was not really needed to make the move.

They had earned enough for it, not by cultivating the land, but by carting wheat to Bawson, and bringing back goods to Gaiman, where they lived for ten years. There were ten children in the family, and because of that, it was considered better to sell the farm in Chubut and go to a place, where they could probably obtain all the land they wanted.

Welsh Weekend 1999 April 16-18 Tacoma, Washington

The Ninth Pacific Northwest Welsh Weekend, this year cosponsored by the Puget Sound Welsh Association and The Welsh Association of the Pacific Northwest, will be held in Tacoma, Washington over the weekend of April 16-18. Events will be located at Christ Episcopal Church, 310 North K Street. The Tacoma Dome Ramada Inn has been designated as the headquarters hotel.

The Weekend will feature the traditional Noson Lawen on Friday, Saturday evening concert, and Gymnfa Ganu, as well as a Welsh folk afternoon and market place during the day on Saturday. The Noson Lawen will feature presentations from many of the usual contributors, but look out for a few surprises. Some food will be provided and drinks will be available for sale. The Saturday night concert will feature the Seattle Welsh Choir, baritone Blake Hodgetts of Eugene, Oregon, harpist Bronn Journey, and his wife Kathryn who sings soprano.

In addition to the music, the concert will be tied together by a selection of readings from the compilation Notes from the Past: Conversations with the Welsh of the Puget Sound Region, to be read by Liz Heath of Tacoma and Bob Smith of Seattle. The Gymanfa Ganu on Sunday afternoon will be directed by Beverly Ratajak of Corvallis, Oregon and Rhiannon Acre of Los Angeles. Both of these talented musicians impressed Gymanfa Ganu participants in the past, and we can look forward to a moving Gymnafa experience.

The Ramada Inn - 2611 East E Street, Tacoma WA 98421, is our headquarters hotel and will hold a block of rooms for participants until March 16th. Driving Directions

To the Ramada Inn at the Tacoma Dome: From I-5 either north or southbound, take exit 133, the City Center exit. Stay to the right in the lane marked for the Tacoma Dome. Turn right at the light at the end of the exit. Go three blocks to the Ramada Inn.

To Christ Episcopal Church from I-5: From I-5 either north or southbound, take exit 133, the City toward Tacoma. Exit from I-705 at the Schuster Parkway exit, and stay in the right lane for the Stadium Way ramp. At the

light, turn right onto Stadium Way. Follow Stadium Way as it curves past Stadium High School & becomes Division Avenue. Stay on Division past Wright Park to North K Street (El Toro Restaurant is on he right corner). Turn right on to K Street. Christ Episcopal Church and Wells Hall are in the next block on the left.

To Christ Episcopal Church from the Ramada Inn: Go west on 26th to Pacific Avenue, Turn right on Pacific and follow it all the way through town to South 7th. Turn left on South 7th (Old City Hall is on the corner). Go one short block and turn right on Commerce which becomes Stadium Way. Follow Stadium Way as it curves past Stadium High School & becomes Division Avenue. Stay on Division past Wright Park to North K Street (El Toro Restaurant is on the right corner). Turn right on to K Street. Christ Episcopal Church and Wells Hall are in the next block on the left.

Set in the midst of the east-end of Vancouver is the Anglican Church of St. David's (2475 Franklin Street, one block north and one block east of Hastings and Nanaimo). Welsh people in Vancouver, who attend this delightful attractive church, find out that not only does it bear our 'Good Saint's' name but it also has a two and one-half foot statue of St. David and a Welsh flag permanently and prominently displayed behind the altar.

The rector of St. David's, Fr. James Penrice, traces Welsh ancestry from both his parents. "Father Jim" has a passionate interest in Celtic history, especially as it relates to St. David. (See a portion of his church newsletter in the next article.)

St. David's Day has particular significance for this church. It has scheduled a special service on Sunday, February 28th, at 4 p.m. After the consecration of a new chapel by the Anglican Bishop of Vancouver, a service will follow. For this solemn occasion all the hymns are Welsh (albeit hymns sung in English).

An invitation is extended to all Welsh Club members to attend this special service. There is no entrance fee.

Afterward you may wish to attend a roast beef dinner at St. David's (\$12, Seniors \$10). But they request advance notice for the dinner (253-8524).

You will find the service and the rector a delight. It is a High Anglican church. Fr Jim informs us that this Communion Mass a sung-family Eucharist is sure to be enjoyed by everyone. He also says the traditional format of his church is based upon the Celtic roots of the Church in Wales.

Who Was St. David?

The following are excerpts from Church newsletters by Fr. James Penrice, of St. David's Anglican Church:


First as a Prince, an extremely bloody battle, nationalism satisfied – but remorse after the passion, a Celtic honest repentance. So our beloved 'Dewi Sant' – St. David of Wales – repented at the "huge blood-letting" that he had witnesses as the leader of an army and sought to compensate by giving up all to do the Lord's work.

From the writings of Rhygifarch, the monk-author who wrote "Vita Davidls" around 1095 A.D., and much detailed research by the University of Wales (E.G. Bowen – "Dewi Sant") we discover that our Patron Saint was a well-travelled man. He was consecrated Bishop by the Patriarch of Jerusalem. David and his monks made extensive trips over Wales, Cornwall and Brittany. Indeed, they built many churches, monasteries and secured many wells for the faithful.

By what many believed to be "divine inspiration" St. David brought an end and peace to many controversies in the church of his time. As a result they elected him Archbishop and saw what benefits stem from the fruits of unity.

In 1120, Pope Callistus II canonized St. David.. Our Patron Saint's last words were, "Be Cheerful, Keep The Faith."

Vancouver Welsh Men's Choir

Choral music was saddened recently by the death on January 25 at age 82 of Robert Shaw, Music Director Emeritus and Conductor Laureate of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. Renowned as North America's greatest conductor of choral music, he created both the 200-voice Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Chorus and the smaller ASO Chamber Chorus. In 1949 he formed the Robert Shaw Chorale, the premier touring group in the US for two decades. His week-long Robert Shaw Choral Workshops at Carnegie Hall drew choral directors and singers from across the country, and it was at that location that he conducted Handel's Messiah on his 80th birthday, with singers both on stage and ranged round the hall in two tiers of box seats! His talents will be sorely missed.

Our first concert in 1999 will be a benefit performance in St. George's Anglican Church, Maple Ridge on Saturday, February 20 at 8 p.m. and the next will be in and for St. Andrew's Wesley Church downtown on Saturday,
