



SPECIAL VISITORS

On Saturday, June 8th the Society welcomed three special guests in the person of Mr. Gwylym Jenkins from LLanmartin, Newport, Gwent, and his associates Dr. and Mrs. John Morrison of Minnesota. They were in Vancouver to attend a Moral Rearmament seminar at which Mr. Jenkins made a presentation on the Llanwern Steelworks. According to Mr. Jenkins, "17 years ago the Steelworks were due to be closed because of the difficult relationship between the union and management. However, using the principles of Moral Rearmament we were able to rebuild the relationships so that today Llanwern has been declared the most profitable steel company in the world, and its methods are used as examples world wide."

Dr. Morrison notes that Moral Rearmament is a non-denominational organization dedicated to putting Christian values to work in the community to creating change in society. Dr. Morrison is a full time volunteer with the organization in Minnesota, and

is dedicated to teaching computer software skills to Cambodian-Americans. "Only through recognizing and healing pain within ourselves, can we move toward healing society," notes Morrison.

Mrs. Louise Morrison
(Phillips) is descended from
Welsh immigrants who settled
in Iowa. As she notes, "no
one in the many generations
who immigrated or were born

I'm determined to go." With

roots in Pentrch Wales.


VANCOUVER CHILDREN'S CHOIR

THE WELSH IMPERIAL SINGERS

1926-1939

In previous editions of our Cambrian News newsletter, we requested from our readers information about the above captioned group of singers, who toured North America during the '30's. We were successful in receiving some details and memorabilia about the group which we ultimately sent to Wales to Mr. Alun Trevor who was compiling data about them for the publication of a book entitled "Cafid Cantorion, The Welsh Imperial Singers."

The book has now been completed and is published by Gnasg Carreg Coch in North Wales. The text is in two languages (Welsh & English) and gives the story in words and pictures of their many tours and concerts. Many of the singers were soloists in their own right, having won at National Eisteddfodau in years gone by.

One of them was Jabez Trevor, father of the author, and a tenor of renown (1888-1972).

The sale of the book which is now on the market will be in aid of this years National Eisteddfod in Wales, Held in Mold North Wales in August.

WELSH MAY BE AS OLD AS THE PYRAMIDS

Archaeologists are rejecting the traditional view that the Welsh language reached Wales only 500 years or so before Christ on the tongues of hordes of sword-waving warriors.

They now believe Welsh has been spoken in Wales for almost 4000 years, since not long after the days when the great pyramids were built in Egypt and Stonehenge was built and rebuilt in Britain.

This makes Welsh one of the most resilient languages of Europe, defeating the efforts of invader after invader to impose their alien tongues. Although it does not make it Europe's oldest language - that honour must presumably go to Finnish or Basque - it does mean that few tongues have been spoken in the same area for so long.

The latest view on when the predecessor of the Welsh language reached Wales is given by Bangor archaeology lecturer Miss Frances Lynch. She believes that 2000 BC, the end of the Neolithic period was the date when the Celtic language which developed into Welsh first arrived in Britain. Quite what language was spoken before the Celts is unknown.

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
