

#### 17 RHYMNEY & PONTLOTTYN STATION

This station is viewed towards the end of the branch with the derelict McClaren No. 2 Colliery to the rear of the station. The line continued past the station, across the Mardy Level Crossing and into the Rhymney Iron Company's Works which were off to the left of the photograph and by this time closed, sidings also led into the McClaren No. 2 Colliery. The station was renamed by the GWR on two occasions, firstly to Rhymney (Pwll Uchan) and two years later it became Rhymney (Lower). Of interest is the B&M Iron Mink No. 500 on the extreme right of the picture, which, as can be plainly seen, is vacuum fitted, a fact not recorded in the GWR Wagon Register, in which the van is renumbered GW101558.





The W.A. will be going to Pat and John Morris' on Saturday, the 27th of June; members will be contacted about transportation and car-pooling.





### CINNAMON CAKE

### The Base:-

4 oz butter

4 oz caster (berry) sugar

2 large egg yolks

8 oz all-purpose flour, sifted

1/2 level teaspoon baking powder

4 tablespoons milk

1 level teaspoon cinnamon

### The Filling:-

4 level tablespoons apricot jam

1 teaspoon lemon juice

### The Topping:-


2 large egg whites

3 oz caster (berry) sugar

8 inch fluted flan tin, slightly greased.

Set oven to hot - 400 °F. Cream the butter and sugar together until pale and fluffy, then beat in the egg yolks. Fold in the flour, baking powder and cinnamon with the milk to give a fairly soft dough. Turn out on to a floured board and knead lightly until smooth. Roll out the pastry to a round about 9 ½2 inches in diameter, then gently shape into flan tin, pressing the dough up the sides. Bake blind (dough covered in foil) for 25 minutes, removing foil 10 minutes before the end of cooking to dry out the pastry base. Allow pastry to cool for 15 minutes, then remove from flan tin and place on a baking sheet or oven proof serving dish. Mix apricot jam and lemon juice together and spread over the pastry base. Reduce oven to moderate - 350 °F. Whisk egg whites until stiff, then add the caster sugar and continue to whisk until the meringue regains it's stiffness and stands in soft peaks. Spoon on top of jam, swirl the top with a fork and bake for 15 - 20 minutes until top is golden brown.

Note: The pastry base could be made a day before and stored in an airtight tin.
