



The Anglesey Hunt sets off along the High Street. The ritual of the Stirrup Cup has taken place in the courtyard of the Bull Hotel and horses and hounds head out for the open country. The pack was kennelled on the outskirts of Llangefni and the scene would have been a familiar one to the townsfolk.

Local Show was a great event —

The Local Agricultural Show was a festive occasion which provided an opportunity for farmers, merchants and local trades people to parade their gaily be-ribboned horses and carts through the town.

In Anglesey an event of this kind was known as a 'Primin', a term derived from the fact that Certificates, or Premiums, were awarded at one time at such shows to all the successful exhibitors.

The parade, on this occasion, is headed by a bread cart, owned by Betsy Jones, Gwalia Bakery Llangefni.

This particular photograph dates from the period 1902-1904.

I am happy to report that the 1992 St. David's Day banquet was a tremendous success. It was the first time in 30 years that a banquet has been held in Cambrian Hall, so it was fitting that the theme was of Welsh Heritage.

The Hall itself had been beautifully decorated with flowers and candles and as always we were served a delicious meal. Our evening included some memorable singing by Mr. David Tuck and community singing followed, led by Mrs. Dorothy Walters.





Cookery Book



The following recipe is taken from "Tastes of Wales", by Gilli Davies, and is published by BBC Books.

"SPICED HONEY LOAF"

1/4 pint of boiling water,
4 level tablespoons of liquid honey,
8 oz. or 225 g. all-purpose flour,
pinch of salt, 4 oz. or 100 g. caster sugar*,
2 teaspoons of mixed spice,
1 level teaspoons each, baking powder and
baking soda.

Preheat oven to 325°F or 160°C. Boil the water and stir in the honey. Oil and flour a 2 lb/1 kg loaf tin. Sieve the flour with the salt and add the sugar and spice. Using a wooden spoon, add the melted honey and water, beating until bubbles appear. Stir in the baking powder and soda.

Pour the mixture into the bread tin and bake for about 45 minutes or until a skewer, inserted into the loaf, comes out clean. Serve the loaf warm or cold, spread with butter or cream cheese.

* Caster sugar is known here in Canada as "Berry Sugar".

Old Welsh counties may come back to life

TWENTY-three local authorities will take over running Wales, restoring the county names of Pembrokeshire, Carmarthenshire and Cardiganshire to the map, if the Conservatives win the general election.

David Hunt, the Welsh secretary, said yesterday that the authorities will result from the merging of 37 district councils and the abolition of eight county councils. Cardiff and Swansea will regain ad-

ministrative controls they lost in 1974.

The plans for Wales are the first to be unveiled from the government's promised reorganisation of local government in Britain. Whitehall said that the proposals for replacing county councils with unitary authorities bearing traditional county names were likely to be repeated in England.
