

## "Stirred But Not Shaken As Earth Moves At Dawn"

Yesterday, people all over north-west Gwynedd, including Anglesey, compared the early morning tremor to an explosion.

The British Geological Survey in Edinburgh has already initiated a study and will be placing questionnaires in local newspapers.

Historically North Wales has had a rather high level of seismic activity, but minimal compared with other earthquake areas throughout the world.

It was 10 years ago, just before 8 a.m. on July 19th, 1984, that the North Wales area experienced an earthquake of 5.4 on the Richter scale which caused minor damage to property.

The epicentre was identified as being on the Lleyn Peninsula.

According to the British Geological Survey, the 1984 earthquake rannked with the largest experienced in Britain over the previous 200 years.

Worldwide, such earthquakes are common, with approximately 1,000 events each year.

Information gleaned from more than 7,000 questionnaires received following the incident revealed that many people then had had to hold on to furniture to steady themselves, pictures and mirrors knocked against walls, ornaments fell over, heavy furniture moved and water splashed out of fish tanks.

The most recent earthquake, in July 1992, registering 3.2 on the Richter scale, shook thousands of homes across Gwynedd.

There are several major geological faults passing through the Gwynedd area. These include the Berw, Dinorwic and Bala faults and the Lleyn Thrust.

The largest earthquakes felt in the Gwynedd epicentral area since 1800 were on July 27, 1852 (north west of Anglesey), July 19th, 1903 (Caernarfon) and December 12th 1940 (off shore

Lleyn Peninsula), which registered 4.7 on the Richter scale.

#### Welsh Windmills

Did you know that Wales produces more power through wind-driven turbines than any other country except Denmark?

Eight of Britain's 19 wind farms are in Wales, but environmental groups, which have supported wind power in the past, are now concerned about the number of windmills that are necessary to produce even a relatively small amount of power. It is estimated that 38,000 windmills on 4,000 square kilometres of land are necessary to produce 10% of Britain's electricity requirements.

Recently, strong objections by residents of areas in which wind farm developments applications have been filed have successfully prevented erection of more turbines on the grounds that they destroy archaeological remains and sites of interest, would intrude on highly exposed hillsides, be noisy and dangerous.

In addition, consumers subsidise these wind farms by a 10% levy on their electricity bills. Wind-generated power costs 11 pence per kilowatt hour, compared to 1.9 pence for coal, 3 pence for gas and 8.5 pence for nuclear generated power.

Each turbine is a massive 120 feet tall with 3 blades each 60 feet long.

### Welsh Lessons/Gwers Gymraeg


Those who are taking lessons in Welsh, have remarked that the class is excellent and they are making good progress.

At the moment the class is full, but if all goes well, there may be classes starting up in September. So don't give up hope!


#### Church Service
