

#### Folk Dancing Rews


As we progress towards the development of new routines, we are finding how much easier the steps come to us, compared to the early days when it took a little longer!

Prior to the "Great Revivals" in Wales, Welsh Folk Dancing was very popular, but suffered under the hand of religious movement that even banned the use of our national instrument, the harp! If it were not for the memory of one lady in South Wales that learned some of the folk dances of Wales as a youth and passed them on to a new generation, there would be no dancing tradition in Wales today.

Nowadays, both in Wales and North America, groups are coming together for Welsh Folk Dancing. Many of these people are also ones that take great interest in the survival of their ancient language. As we remember St. David, let us celebrate, but remind ourselves that the survival of our culture and traditions is in the hands of those that pass them on the the new generations to enjoy and respect. Tell the younger ones of the past generations, so that they are remembered in the future.

There has been a slight alteration in the arrival and departure dates for the Dunvant Male Voic Choir.


They will arrive here on Monday, September 18th and leave on Thursday, September 21st.
