

The toast to the Queen was proposed by Mr. Fraser Wheeler; and the toasts to Canada and Wales were proposed by Don Murray and Dr. Gwyn Bebb respectively. "What exceptionally-well crafted speeches— and what oratory!, mused St. David, "and the listeners paid such rapt attention!"

"I felt so much at home", thought Dewi Sant, when recalling how Alan Tucker, Enid Lewis, and Nerys Haqq treated the audience to stirring solo and communal music— "it was indeed heavenly music".

The Nawdd Sant recalled also, how, after the feast, the group moved down to the "Red Dragon". He admired the plaque that Mr. Fraser Wheeler unveiled — a plaque that recognized the contributions of members to the well-being of the Vancouver Welsh Society.

The Patron Saint chuckled to himself as the "Leek Eating Ceremony" came back to mind. The precision of the volunteer soldiers and drummer; the accolades given to him personally by the bards; and the directorship of Jeff Owen pleased him immensely.

As he readied himself for a noon forty-winker, Dewi Sant, with a sigh of satisfaction, finished his reverie with the thought: "What organization; what camaraderie; what warmth. Thank you for paying homage to my memory".

The Welsh in Southern Australia

With the discovery of copper at Kapunda in 1843 and at Burra in 1845, the newly-founded colony of South Australia attracted substantial numbers of Welsh miners and smeltermen, increasing the Welsh-born population from about 300 in 1846 to 900 by 1851. By the late 1840s Burra had its own Welsh quarter named Llwchwr, with street names such as Llanelly, Llysnewydd and Penclawdd. By 1859 there were two Welsh chapels in the town, one Baptist and the other Independent (Congregationalist)-early symbols of the denominational diversity that marked Welsh religious life. Later discoveries of copper at Moonta and Wallaroo greatly swelled the numbers of Welsh miners and their families, and it is possible to recognise the outline of a Welsh community in these northern South Australian towns in the 1860s and 1870s.

One of the Welshmen working in the Burra Burra copper-mines by 1849 was 21-year-old William Meirion Evans (1826-83) of Llanfrothen in Merionethshire. Although not an ordained minister at this stage, he is credited with being the first person to hold religious services in the Welsh language on the Australian continent when he preached to his compatriots in Burra in 1849. In later years he became the prime mover in establishing the Welsh Calvinistic Methodist Connexion in Victoria. Under its auspices, he was also the founder and editor of two Welsh-language periodicals-Yr Australydd (the Australian) in 1866-72, and Yr Ymwelydd (the Visitor) in 1874-76. Published in Victoria, these two monthly journals, which were circulated throughout the Australian colonies and New Zealand, acted as a focus for the widely dispersed Welsh population and kept them in touch with developments in Wales. Victims eventually of what the editorials ceaselessly condemned as the apathy of the Welsh community, they nevertheless served for a number of years as the voices of a Welsh network in the colonies. Replete with detailed accounts of the numerous events in the Welsh religious calendar, especially the numerous Eisteddfodau (musical and literary festivals) and Cymanfaoedd Canu (hymn-singing assemblies), they provide an invaluable insight into the cultural and social milieu of Welsh Australia in the second half of the nineteenth century.

VANCOUVER WELSH MEN'S CHOIR

While we have an upcoming benefit concert for Mission's Heritage Park School in the Clarke Foundation Theatre in Mission on Saturday March 28, the month got off to a particularly auspicious start with our participation in the St. David's Day choral eucharist in Christ Church Cathedral. We opened with Joanna which was followed by an arrangement of Psalm 23 by William Mathias specially commissioned by the Rhymni Valley National Eisteddfod in 1990. An arrangement of Hyfrydol was followed by Kirke Mechem's Blow Ye The Trumpet as the anthem and Blaenwern as the offertory hymn. The Sanctus was an adaptation by the cathedral organist of Aberystwyth, and during the actual communion we sang Tydi A Roddaist and Diadem. The service concluded, of course, with Cwm Rhondda. A reprise of Diadem as a voluntary after the service received prolonged applause from the congregation. Together with Canon Herbert O'Driscoll's sermon on "St. David" it was a most memorable morning.

From Our Past.....

Archeological detectives can glean much knowledge from the past by studying the 150 or so cromlechi that exist in Wales.


A cromlech is a Welsh word that is now well-established in archeology. The word is derived from **crom**(bent) and **llech**(flat stone).

In essence, cromlechi were burial chambers and are the earliest *permanent* constructions of man, having been erected 3,500—3,200 B.C. Some of them are, therefore, 1,500 years older than the Egyptian pyramids!

The distribution of the cromlechi in Wales has a decided bias towards the western seaboard, and suggests therefore that the builders were familiar with sea routes. Another implication is that since the very heavy stones that were used in the construction had to be manhandled, there being no machinery those days, then there had to be a concentration of manpower in the area where a cromlech was erected. This in turn implied that the early farmers had improved their methods of farming to such a degree that a surplus of grain was being achieved, enabling manpower to be diverted to building the cromlechi in that particular area.

The erection of the cromlechi no doubt involved a concentrated effort by several communities who pooled their labour for the purpose. It is estimated that it required some 200 men to erect the larger cromlechi.

Apart from being burial chambers the cromlechi were used as a centre by the community for the *performance of rituals* in the presence of their ancestors. No doubt the best preserved cromlech in Wales is in Pentre Ifan.

WATERMILL The Life Story of a Welsh Cornmill

In his book, titled above, David LLewellyn Davies of Kamloops, traces the very interesting life of Jonathan Rogers whose name appears on the dedication stone of our Cambrian Hall.

Young Jonathan, was a monoglot Welshman till the age of 16 when he left for Liverpool. Seven years later he landed in Montreal in 1887, and then boarded the new CPR train for its inaugural run to a shanty town of 2000 the then recently re-named Vancouver. Two weeks after arriving, he purchased at a public auction, four parcels of land of densely-forested land in what is now downtown Vancouver.

The book traces Jonathan Rogers' entrepreneurial success in a broad range of commercial interests that made him very wealthy. He became a respected public figure and benefactor, and he left a quarter of a million dollars to deserving causes in Vancouver. A sugar refinery, a downtown office block and a neighbourhood park still bear his name in our city.




TASTES OF WALES



WYAU SIR FÔN - ANGLESEY EGGS

450g (1 lb) peeled potatoes 75g (3oz) grated Caerphilly cheese 50g (2oz) butter 50g (2oz) plain flour 3 washed leeks 4 hardboiled eggs 600ml (1 pint) milk salt and ground black pepper

- 1) Chop up the leeks
- 2) Boil the potatoes until soft
- 3) Boil the leeks for 10 minutes
- 4) Drain the leeks and potatoes
- 5) Add the leeks to the potatoes, add some black pepper and mash together
- 6) Melt the butter in a saucepan and remove from the heat
- 7) Stir the flour into the butter until smooth
- 8) Slowly stir in the milk
- 9) Slowly stir and bring to the boil for around 3 minutes until the mixture thickens
- 10) Add half of the cheese and season
- 11) Deshell the eggs and cut each in half
- 12) Arrange the eggs into a family sized oven proof dish
- 13) Arrange the pototoes and leeks around the edge of the dish
- 14) Pour the sauce over the eggs, potatoes and leeks
- 15) Sprinkle the remainder of the cheese over the dish
- 16) Brown swiftly under the grill



TASTES OF WALES

SNOWDON PUDDING - PWDIN ERYRI

40z (100g) suet

3 eggs

loz (25g) cornflour or rice

3oz (75g) demerara / brown sugar

4oz (100g) breadcrumbs

20z (50g) stoned raisins

3oz (75g) lemon marmalade

Grated rind of 1 lemon

Pinch of salt

- 1) Mix the suet, breadcrumbs and salt together.
- 2) Add the lemon rind and sugar to the mixture.
- 3) Grease the pudding basin spread half the raisins on the bowl.
- Beat the eggs and marmalade.
- 5) Add the eggs, marmalade and the remainder of the raisins to the mixture.
- 6) Pour into the basin.
- 7) Cover and boil for 1.5 hours.

Serve really hot with a white sauce.
