




Gareth Prytherch presented a brief history of the Welsh choral tradition.

The Hebrew Connection

(excerpted from the Mid-Island Welsh Association Newsletter)

My old chapel, [Carmel, is] closed and for sale. It was a very Welsh chapel with Welsh prayers and Welsh hymns, and the English sermon was always followed by a rousing Welsh oration.

It was many years before I realised that *CARMEL* was not Welsh but Hebrew and that most of the chapels in my village of Beaufort had Hebrew names. There were Moriah, Soar, Bethesda, Ebenezer, Siloam, Salem, and others.

Many of the people of Wales paid a great deal of attention to religion in the 18th and 19th centuries. It has been said that religion was stronger than national-

ism and that, given the opportunity, some Welsh people would have left Wales and migrated to the Holy Land in order to be closer to the holy places.

Welsh map-makers liked to superimpose the map of Palestine (now partly the state of Israel) onto the map of Wales. Jerusalem is superimposed onto Becon, which puts Bethlehem on the road to Merthyr Tydfil, and Nazareth in northeast Wales in Llanrhaidr-ym-Mochnant. It would have been unreasonable to change the names of the old Welsh villages and towns to make Wales more like the Holy Land, but it was possible to give the chapels Hebrew names.

It is interesting to note that Sodom and Gomorrah are placed well to the south of Wales, in England.
