

## WELSE KITCEEN

Chicken and Leek Soup

Swp Cyw Iar a Chenin

1 small chicken 2 chicken stock cubes 4 pints water

6 leeks salt and pepper



Clean and joint the chicken, add to the stock cubes dissolved in the water in a large pan. Clean leeks and remove some of the green tops. Cut into 1/2 inch slices and add to stock. Season to taste and simmer for 3 hours until the meat is tender. Cool and skim off the chicken fat. Reheat for a further 30 minutes. To serve: remove the meat from the bones and place at the bottom of warmed soup bowls. Pour the hot soup over the chicken.



#### Meanwhile Back Home......

......Speaking of movies, why was the fishing town of Conwy turned into a Napoleonic French village at the end of September? Could it be that Hollywood goes Welsh?!!

"The Proposition" is a historical film that tells the story of a Napoleonic war widow who is forced to drive her cattle south to escape destitution. For Conwy residents, it was a wonderful opportunity to dress up in period costume and play extras on the set - in spite of a biting wind and mud strewn quay!

Irish actor Patrick Bergin, who is in the film with American actress Theresa Russell, praised the talents of the Conwy people and when asked what he thought of the area, told reporters, "It's beautiful here". It was his first time in the fishing/market town and he was enjoying it very much. The extras thought he was pretty special too, "There's nothing show-off about him. He's just one of the lads", said Mr. George Gordon and also added that Theresa Russell is "very, very sweet".

"The Proposition" is a co-production between S4C, Peak Viewing Productions and Unapix of Los Angeles. Strath Hamilton, director of the film said, "The extras have been terrific. They have wonderful faces. You can see they love life". There is a Welsh language version of the film, that stars Nicola Beddoe and Aneurin Hughes, for S4C.

While filming in Conwy has been completed, the entire film will not be finished until next March. Worldwide cinema release is planned for next Autumn.

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Meanwhile, Conwy's townsfolk consider playing host to two more film projects including another major Hollywood enterprise.

Susan Place, executive director of Tall Ships Haven, (based in Conwy,) is in discussion with two companies keen to use tall ships for filming. This could provide a huge boost to the local economy.

#### **Out and About**

Ascending Snowdon the easy way, by train our views of the surrounding countryside were obscured by a thick blanket of mist at about 1,500 feet up. Even at the summit, there was nothing to be seen, save for the fog, thick enough to grab hold of, and so passengers rushed into the cafe. Lennie Casey, summit manager served drinks at the crowded bar. For half the year, May to October, he lives on top of Snowdon (3,560 feet) in probably the highest home in Britain.

"What's it like living in splendid isolation on Mount Parnassus?" I asked. "It's one of the busiest buildings in North Wales" said Lennie. "Some people see it as a refuge. They take socks off and hang clothes over radiators and pictures. It's unbelievable.

"It gets very tedious sometimes, especially when it's like this" he said waving at the fog outside. "With no natural sunlight it can be very depressing. Cabin fever sets in". Winds of 80 - 90 m.p.h. are common.

In peak season, 4,000 people a day may visit the cafe. Lennie shares accommodation with four staff, mostly students. On magical evenings, the fog will lift and the staff barbecue on the cafe roof.

"You get 60 degree panoramic views" explained Lennie, "You can see the Wicklow mountains in Ireland, the Isle of Man, St. David's Point in Pembroke and on one very rare occasion, the tip of the Outer Hebrides".

Lennie came to Snowdon via a career in adult education and outdoor pursuits. He lives on Anglesey. For seven years, he has spent half his year on Snowdon, where his wife and two young daughters visit for occasional weekends. Winters he works below, restocking the cafe and gift shop.

"Some people see the romantic side, but it's

damned hard work," Said Lennie. Over the years he has co-ordinated numerous mountain rescues and handled medical emergencies. Rail trippers blame the staff for the weather! "People ask, 'When do you get a view' or 'Where is the escalator to the summit?".

A tame seaguil called George is the cafe's first morning customer; another is a grey squirrel living in disused drains. "I've also found toads in the cafe," said Lennie, "How they get up here, I don't know."

A more contentious visitant is the Snowdon Spook. "It is a presence felt by all members of staff," said Lennie. "There are many situations that can't be explained." Switches are mysteriously tripped at dead of night. "We've tried taping them down, but they still get switched off."

Other apparitions, like the Brocken Spectre have a scientific pedigree. "We get very exceptional cloud formations," said Lennie, who is also auxiliary weather observer to the Met Office. "Two or three times a season, you see the Brocken Spectre, when your shadow is cast on to the cloud below at sunrise or sunset, elongated with a glory or halo round your head. It's pretty spectacular. And once I saw the Parhelia, know to laymen as the sun dog, when there appear to be three suns in parallel."

Such experiences redeem everything. As do the bonds between staff, close as on a desert island. An emotional farewell, with hugs and tears, took place when I visited as students left after the Snowdon season to return to university. One rushed after me to say, "Make sure Lennie gets an accolade. He's been doing this job for seven years and it's so hard."

"What do you miss most up here?" I asked Lennie. "Getting into my car and driving away," he answered.
