

# **British Pension Claimers**

In last February's newsletter, we published a letter received by one of our members from the Canadian Alliance of British Pensioners concerning the entitlement of retirement pensions for those living outside of the British Isles. We publish the text letter once again:


"The Canadian Alliance of British Pensioners is a group of unpaid volunteers whose chief aim is to put pressure on the U.K. Government to pay cost-of-living increase to British residents and widows pensions under the United Kingdom Social Security Scheme.

Pensions are payable at the same rates as in the United Kingdom in the EEC countries (Portugal, Germany, France, etc.) and under reciprocal agreements to pensioners in, e.g. Austria, Cyprus, Malta, Mauritius, Finland, Sark, Iceland, Switzerland, Israel, Turkey, Jersey, and Guernsey. Pensioners in a further group of countries receive increases payable after the date an agreement entered into force: Bermuda, Jamaica, S. Ireland and the United States of America. We want equal benefits, since we paid national insurance contributions during our working lives in Britain.

In our fight to get indexing of pensions here, we would like to say we represent all U.K. pensioners (and future pensioners) now resident in Canada."

Wales Endeavour to Shed it's Coal-Blackened Legacy

The heart of Welsh coal country has changed dramatically from the way it was depicted in the bleak, 1940 film, "How Green Was My Valley". The quickest way a visitor finds that out is by mentioning the film to former coal miners Bill Myring and Terry Dower.

They agree that Hollywood's portrayal of life in a grimy coal town more that 50 years ago was accurate. But Mr. Myring and Mr. Dower say too many foreign investors believe the polluted and dreary Wales of the film still exists, which makes their job of trying to save the Cynon Valley from economic stagnation extremely difficult.

The former miners are members of the valley's borough council. It has so successful fighting the Hollywood image that Japanese owned Hitachi Consumer Products (U.K.) Ltd. and Gooding Sanken Ltd., a manufacturer of power supplies for computers and printers now operate plants nearby.

But the male unemployment rate is more than 30 per cent in the Cynon Valley and most of the jobs for women are low skilled, low paid and part time. The enduring negative image crated by the film doesn't help. Mr. Myring says, "We are constantly reminding potential investors that those days are completely gone."

Richard Llewellyn, who wrote the best-selling book on which the movie was based, wouldn't recognise the network of valleys just to the north of Cardiff these days - in part because of all the money poured into the area by the British

government, the European Community an the Welsh Development Agency. The latter alone has pumped an estimated C\$1.57 billion into roads, utilities, buildings and environmental operations into South Wales in the past six vears.

Once black with the grime of more than 500 collieries, the valleys are green once more.

The disappearance of polluting industry has helped. So has government's effort to remove all traces of former mines and reclaim the land spoiled by coal tips - the heaps of rock, mud and coal discharged by mines. The program began in 1966, after 28 adults and 116 children were killed in Aberfan when a coal tip slid down a mountain and crushed the local school.

"There are playing fields over the mine I used to work at in Penrhiwceiber." Mr. Dower says, "And down the road whee the new school is, there used to be a tip that had been burning for 20 years before they finally put it out."

At it's peak, in the early part of this century, the Welsh coal industry fuelled the ships and industrial engines of the world. It was said that among the traders crowding the floor of the Coal Exchange in Cardiff, could be found the highest concentration of millionaires in the world.
