

ST. DAVIDS CATHEDRAL, DYFED, WALES

The first church here was built some 400 years ago by David (Dewi) later to become A David and patron saint of Wales. The present cathedral is at least the third to be built on this site. The Norman church we see today was begun around 1800 with additions over the years culminating in the adding of the third stage to the tower in about 1820. On the left are the americs of the Bishop's Palace excited between the 12th and 18th continues. It special interest inside are the solution of David, the splended call calling. Jime wood carving, and a 14th century screen.

Mining held Grip On Wales

Pontypridd, Wales (CP)

Richard Llewellyn, in his epic novel How Green Was My Valley, has narrator Huw Morgan describe what the land around his home was like in the middle of the last century.

"It was so green and fresh and clean with wind from off the fields and dews from the mountain. The river was not very wide, only about 20 feet, but so clear you would see every inch of rock through the bubbling water and so full of fish that nobody thought of using a rod."

It was mostly farmland then, but already says Morgan, "there was a colliery....(poking) it's skinny black fingers out of the bright green."

Pretty idyllic, overall. No one could imagine what changes a couple of decades would bring.

With the insatiable demand for coal to fuel the Industrial Revolution, not just in Britain but in the rest of the world, and to stoke the boilers of Her Majesty's ships that ruled the seas, collieries mushroomed all over South Wales.

There were more than 50 in the Rhondda Valley alone, employing more than 50,000 men and boys and producing fine Welsh steam coal, millions of tonnes, mined and transported on trains running to Cardiff, the busiest coal port anywhere.

All around there was the screech of pithead wheels and of clanging drams (buggies) while huge chimneys from the coal-fired steam engines that mechanised the pits spewed filth into the sky.

The mine owners made millions. The miners made, more or less, a living wage. There was full employment, prosperity even - but at what a cost in human and environmental terms.

The green hills were soon serrated with terraces to build rows of bleak stone houses for the miners. Where there weren't houses and collieries, the hillsides were blanketed with slag heaps.

Then the rivers died, poisoned by slag tailings.

But now in the final years of this millennium the wheel has turned full circle. Coal mining has ceased in the valleys of South Wales except for one pit and you suspect Huw Morgan pining at the end of the book for his "lost" valley, would be delighted.

Unfortunately, unemployment runs at 20 to 30 per cent in the former mining villages.

The story is told in the Rhondda, South Wales' most famous and most productive mining valley.

It's a story of greed and sacrifice, of loyalty and heroism and terrible industrial strife.

"We sank shafts, they built castles," one miner says of the Victorian capitalist owners in a letter preserved in the park.

The miners toiled for a few sovereigns a week and ended up with arthritis and emphysema, silicosis and glaucoma - in their graves, many of them by age 40.

Amendment to Article C (3) Quorum substitute the number twelve so that the amended section (3) reads:-

A quorum is twelve (12) voting members present

The amendment requires that at least 75% of the members present at the meeting accept this motion for it to pass.
