

Dylan Thomas Collector Jeff Towns to speak at Simon Fraser University Library.

SFU Library in collaboration with SFU English Department is pleased to present Dylan Thomas expert, Jeff Towns in a lecture entitled "Dylan Thomas Bibliographical Curios".

Jeff Towns is the founder and owner of Dylan's Bookstore in Swansea. Established in 1971, it has become renowned for its collectable works and its new works on Dylan Thomas. It has also acquired materials from the libraries of some of Dylan's close friends, such as Vernon Watkins, Wynford Vaughan Thomas and Daniel Jones.

Gymro mwyngalon, Edrych yma ar fy medd. Dwys ystyria Fel yr wyt ti – y bum innau, Fel yr wyf fi – y bydd dithau.

Warmhearted Welshman, Look here upon my grave. Consider seriously Like you are – I once was, As I am – you will be also.

Idris Hughes suggests the following variations:

"Cymro wyngalon" for the first line meaning "purehearted Welshman" and in the last line he suggests "y byddi dithau" which has the same meaning "you will be also", but is grammatically better!

All in all, an impressive response from both John and Idris. I'm sure this knowledge of their ancestor will delight the descendents. Da jawn wir!!

YR HYBARCH ARCHDDERWYDD Cymru THE HONOURABLE ARCHDRUID of Wales



"Fellow Gorseddogion:

I am very conscious of this honour, and thank you for it. I shall endeavour to maintain the standard which has been achieved by a number of remarkable people, including some of genius, who have held the office of Archdruid of Wales. My thanks go to my predecessor Meirion, for his wise leadership and his help to me in every detail.

It is unusual for the Gorsedd to engage in studying its own navel, and to ask exactly what sort of movement it is. We know a great deal about Iolo Morganwg and his genius, which created us through his lively imagination and highly original flights of fancy. Also Cynan, who gave a unique dignity and polish to our ceremonies. But today, I intend to ask exactly what manner of function we fulfil in contemporary Wales.

We are a society of poets, litterateurs, scholars, musicians and artists; drawn from among the supporters and lovers of the Welsh language and culture. Notwithstanding our colourful apparel, regalia and ceremonies, there is one englyn which encapsulates everything that we are:

Nid ei chledd ond ei gweddi - a'i harddwch A rydd urddas arni; Mae nodded tu mewn iddi I'r Gymraeg, rhag ei marw hi.

It is not its sword but its prayer - and its beauty Which gives it dignity;
There is sanctuary within it (the Gorsedd)
For the Welsh tongue, lest it perish.

For well over a century, there have been numerous movements formed specifically to protect and defend the Welsh tongue - some by constitutional and lawful means: others through more militant activities and law-breaking. From Cymru Fydd during the last century but one, to Cymuned, only last year. The list is as honourable as it is lengthy. There was - and there is - a need for each one of them.

But the Gorsedd of Bards is different. It is through our appearance and our ceremonies that we achieve our aims. Our membership is of a different nature. You cannot gain entry to the Gorsedd Circle merely by signing your name and paying a fee. Each and every one of us has gained acceptance either by examination, university degree or winning a competition: or has been honoured for some service of national importance or for a lifetime of unstinting service. In Wales, the Gorsedd is the fount of all honour.

All these other movements were necessary. During the century which has just ended, the percentage of Welsh-speakers fell from 54% to 18%. I shudder to imagine how calamitous last year's Census will prove to be, when the figures are revealed in due course.

At the start of the twentieth century, though Welsh was strong and a majority spoke the language, it was a despised tongue, regarded as useless, and held in contempt. It was a mere dialect to be looked down on, to be insulted, to be left behind and got rid of as soon as possible. In consequence, hardly anyone lifted a finger to preserve or protect it anywhere. It went into sharp decline, though, paradoxically, respect towards it started to increase gradually, until today, it has become a quasi-official language in its own land. The old Wales was more Welsh in speech, but less Welsh in spirit. Wales today is more Welsh in spirit though less Welsh in speech. Looking at contemporary figures, one may well ask: 'How much more parlous would the situation of Welsh have been today, had it not been for these various movements, and without the Gorsedd of Bards, to protect it?'.

As we know, all these movements formed to safeguard Welsh were voluntary in nature. But some five years ago, the situation was transformed utterly, when Wales chose to grant itself a measure of self-government.

Following this, the Government of Wales Act 1998 has placed the legal responsibility for the language of Wales firmly upon the shoulders of the National Assembly. Section 32 of the Act states: 'The Assembly may do anything it considers appropriate to support the Welsh language.' These words carry the force of law, where the power and the responsibility have been transferred clearly and unambiguously from Westminster to Wales, where, of course, they ought to have remained throughout the centuries.

The Government of Wales appointed a Minister for Culture who has no Welsh. An appointment which has as much wisdom about it as if they had appointed a vegetarian to be Minister of Agriculture. In consequence, when Mr Dafydd Glyn Jones, one of the leading scholars of Wales attempted to assist our Government by contributing the fruits of his lifetime research and unique knowledge of the University of Wales they ridiculed and insulted him. To them, Dafydd Glyn was no more than an extremist, a dreamer, an agitator. But was not lolo Morganwg also considered extremist, a dreamer and an agitator in his day?

It was only recently that the Government of Wales took upon itself to consider the meaning and obligations of Welshness. An ambitious report was produced, bearing the title Our Language: Its Future [published in English only]. It was explained how Welsh will, in time, have been preserved and will be equal in all respects with English. But: it is not foreseen that Welsh will, either in education or the great world outside, be anything other than an optional language, whilst English will remain, as it is now, compulsory.

I need only say this: compulsory English and optional Welsh have been the curse of Wales for centuries. They have been responsible for the subordinate status of Welsh in every sphere to this day. This was the cause of "The Blue Books" (a report on education in Wales in the early nineteenth century, which attributed all ills to the fact that the people spoke Welsh and not English): the object of the "Welsh Not" (a piece of wood hung around the necks of children who dared speak Welsh in school which marked their shame and caused them to be severely punished). It was these which turned our Welsh-speaking valleys into non-Welsh-speaking valleys - in accord with the deliberate intention of the government, and in which money was no object. The political will was there, to stamp out Welsh completely. The present Report shows, not only lack of comprehension, but lack of backbone. I ask: 'What was the purpose of transferring the responsibility for Welsh, if that responsibility is to be betrayed exactly as before?'

Where the sinister word 'compulsion' is concerned, we must grasp the nettle - in education, planning, public notices both indoors and out, advertising and the private sector generally. Yes, 'compulsion'! With Welsh, the language of Wales, prominent everywhere, being placed first or uppermost. I do not envisage aiming this compulsion at the individual citizen, but at the need to create a Welsh ambiance everywhere throughout our country. This to be achieved within a definite time scale of, say seven years - no more. It was only by compulsion that they succeeded in decimating the Welsh language: it is only by compulsion that we shall restore it. We are already under compulsion to use English; compulsion to pay income tax; and compulsion to put up with wars declared at the whim of Tony Blair - why cannot Welsh be as compulsory as these, which, like them or not, we accept? And in order to ensure that the Government of Wales can appreciate and understand the extent and scope of its own problem, an independent Commission on the state and future of the language should be established - now.

One of the main functions of the Gorsedd of Bards has been to act as the conscience of the Welsh nation. And to speak out loudly and firmly when the need is perceived - a milk and water approach will not do.

When our only Government behaves, at best, like Philistines: at worst like the herd of swine who trample on our heritage, envisaged in Saunders Lewis's masterpiece Buchedd Garmon, then it it high time to speak firmly. 'He that hath ears to hear, let him hear'.
