

So, remember I do love you And I wish that you were here So, I must say "Goodbye my dear"


There I stood beside the mailbox With a face so very red. Instead of mailing you my letter, I had opened it instead.


A great time was had by the those attending - believe me. We cooked our "chow", shared good humour and laughed at the weather.

"Updated verses give old favourite a new meaning for the supporters"

The Rugby World Cup version of Bread of Heaven has been updated for the album.

Producer Rick Blaskey said, "It's very big and rich, with such a powerful melody and so much resonance.

The original first verse and chorus remain the same, but Mr. Blaskey's partner, Charlie Skarbek, has written a new second and third verses in support of the Welsh team.

Mr. Blaskey, aware of the potential cries of sacrilege, said, "We are slightly but reverently contemporising it and making it sound like it never sounded before."

The original Welsh words were written during the 18th Century by William Williams (1717 -1791), of Pantycelyn, near Llandovery.

Arglwydd, Arwain Drwy'r Anialwch was translated into the English Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah by a namesake and contemporary, Peter Williams. It was put to this tune in 1907 by John Hughes, originally from Dowlais, Merthyr, for the opening of a chapel called Rhondda in Pontypridd.

Wales and the Crises, (The Great War - 1914 to 1818)

The Prime Minister, Mr. Asquith in the House of Commons last week, said, inter alia, - "The people of Wales have reason to feel proud of the splendid way in which their eligible men have flocked to the colours since the war began.

Mr. Llywelyn Williams, M.P. stated that he had it on good authority that Wales had contributed from 140,000 to 150,000 recruits.

The population of Wales including Monmouthshire, is only about two and a quarter million, so there is good ground for thinking that Wales hold the premier position among the four countries of the British Isles as regards the number of recruits to the population (per capita) raised since the outbreak of hostilities.......".

(Extract from the Cambrian News, 12th November 1915.)

The Welsh National Memorial Roll of Honour at Cardiff is a book of 1,100 parchment pages, bearing the names of 35,000 Welsh soldiers and sailors who lost their lives during the war. A page is turned each day by a Welsh veteran, and this will be done until the end of the book.

Wales was not to maintain the lead in recruitment, however, for "The Communication Trench" gives the following final figures - "24.02% of the male population of England enlisted in the Great War. Other figures were 23.71% for Scotland, 21.52 for Wales and 6.14% for Ireland. New Zealand led the Overseas lists with 19.35% of her total male population of European descent. Canada - 13.48%, Australia - 13.43% and South Africa - 11.12%.
