First Aid Anyone?
St. John's Ambulance are offering a course in first-aid which includes C.P.R. level A (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation) It deals with choking & the unconscious patient, which could be due to many things such as fainting or Diabetic Coma It also suggests adding AED (Automatic external defibrillation) to the list. This last has been taught to all major office staff and in the Malls, and they all have defibrillators in their first-aid kits. They would come to the Cambrian Hall but need a DVD player and a TV with a working remote to present. We could also go to their place at 6111 Cambie St. at 45th. The cost is \$39 per person for a half day course which gives certification. If this seems too much, they can provide a two hour talk with no hands-on experience. In memory of Tecwyn Roberts
December 7, 1929 – November 21, 2009



Tecwyn, a long time member and former President of our Society, passed away on November 21st after a lengthy illness. A Funeral Service was held on Monday, November 30th at All Saints Catholic Church in Coquitlam. Our Society was well represented. At the Gathering which followed at the Church Hall we heard moving tributes by Tecwyn's family including his many grandchildren. John Pritchard spoke of his personal friend of forty five years; a proud son of Wales: I quote some of his reminiscences

“Tecwyn was a long-standing member of the society, who served on the Executive and also as President. During his term as President the roof fell in!! This was so literally and not metaphorically. An accumulation of snow cracked the rafters of the Cambrian Hall. With a steady hand at the helm, Tecwyn led us through the damage appraisal, the insurance jungle and the repair of our beloved building. He was a veritable tower of strength at a dark period in our history. 'Roedd yn gawr o arweinydd.

Tecwyn was an avid golfer and for many years organized the Welsh Society's annual golf tournament. The event was always lots of fun.

[Editor's note: Not only did Tecwyn organize the tournament, even when he was no longer able to play, he also personally provided many of the prizes.]

LLinos and I were invited to Deirdre and Tecwyn's 50th wedding anniversary celebration. All the children and grandchildren were there. It was a beautiful affair and demonstrated to us the love Tecwyn had for them all - and as well how his love was reciprocated. Noson i'w chofio yn wir. A memorable evening indeed!

Tecwyn was raised in the town of LLanrwst in North Wales. He was educated at the local Grammar School. One of his teachers influenced him greatly-and taught him to write prose with flair and impeccable grammar. After retirement Tecwyn put his skills to good use by reading the National Post and making a career of writing letters to the editor. His expertise in the realm of gerunds, unattached participles and split infinitives was phenomenal-and the editors became regular targets of his opprobrium. His ripostes were legendary. Those editors must have trembled when they received a letter signed by one Tecwyn Roberts!! He often trumpeted his disdain for political correctness and with pithy aphorisms he crucified those guilty parties - especially those that were left of centre. Tecwyn would indeed have made a fine journalist and would have called a spade a spade with grammatical excellence”

[Editor's note: At one point I had the temerity to insert a few commas into an article Tecwyn had submitted to the

Newsletter. I received a note observing that I had ‘liberally sprinkled’ his article with commas and that his Grammar School English teacher had insisted that conjunctions did not require commas]

Tecwyn was born in Llanrwst, North Wales. In his youth he became an avid sportsman; playing cricket, rugby, field hockey, soccer, and climbing mountains in Snowdonia with childhood friends. From 1948 to 1950 he served with the British forces in Malaya as part of his National Service. Returning from Asia, he joined the Chartered Bank of India, Australia and China in London, where he met the love of his life, Deirdre.

When Tecwyn transferred to Ottawa with the Bank of Nova Scotia, Deirdre followed soon afterwards and they were married at St. Patrick’s Church in Ottawa on October 20, 1956. They moved to Montreal and Winnipeg, where Nicholas and Catherine were born and then to Vancouver where Jennifer and Chris were born, settling in Coquitlam, where they have lived for 44 years.

Tecwyn had a lengthy and distinguished career in banking, eventually retiring from the National Bank of Canada in 1996. In his retirement, Tec liked reading his newspapers, keeping up with politics, watching sports, gardening, golfing, and planning trips to take with Deirdre all over the world. One of his greatest joys was being grandfather to Richard, Frances, Patrick, Evan, Lucas, Alex, Hunter, Vaughn and Blake. We in the Welsh Society remember his active participation in society affairs and events and in particular his regular attendance at the Sunday service where he loved to sing Welsh hymns and most of all to speak Welsh with his friends. We extend

our sympathy to Deirdre, his wife of 53 years, their children and grandchildren.

Congratulations to the Welsh Society
(A letter in The Celtic Connection)

I want to congratulate the Welsh community on their 80th anniversary of Vancouver’s Cambrian Hall on 17th Avenue near Main Street.

Having the opportunity to grow up on 17th Avenue along with many other Irish families such as the O’Tooles, Evistons, Peakes, Colls, Douglas and Moores, the Cambrian Hall has a special place in the Vancouver-Irish heart and memory. As a child, I would often look upon the 10 names of the Welsh immigrants and admire the long ago date of 1929 on the cornerstone of the building.

The “Welsh” Hall, as we sometimes called it, has also been a gathering place for a number of our Irish organizations and societies for over 60 years. The proximity to St. Patrick’s Parish down on 12th and Main made it an attractive place for the community to gather. In the history of the Vancouver Irish community, many annual general meetings, regular general meetings, anniversary dinner/dances, darts tournaments, Christmas and Halloween parties, day long St. Patrick’s Day festivities, post game Gaelic football and hurling celebrations, concerts, theatre plays, christenings, wakes, ... you name it – were all held at the Cambrian Hall.

The Irish were very welcome at more than favourable rates for years on end. Though there might have been the odd complaint about Guinness-sticky floors, there seemed to be a mutual respect between the two respective Celtic communities.

In the 1950s the Vancouver Irish Society met on the first Thursday of each month at the hall and as a member of the Vancouver Irish Sporting and Social Club that was formed in 1974, I can attest that many years of the club's successes were due to the availability of the hall for numerous occasions. The Red Dragon Pub, beneath the hall, proved to be a popular spot for a number of competitive darts tournaments with the Welsh often prevailing over the Irish.

God bless your 'founders' and the 2010 executive and members of Cymdeithas Gymraeg Vancouver! Your success over these last 80 years serves as a template for those in the Irish community who are diligently working towards our own Irish centre in Langley, B.C.

The woman behind the worldwide success of the Froncysyllte Male Voice Choir is moving on to pastures new. Ann Atkinson, a talented mezzo-soprano, is looking forward to focusing more on her solo singing career. "It's been an amazing journey. When I took over the choir nine years ago, my aim was just to ensure that everyone enjoyed themselves and enjoyed their singing. I had no idea that I would find myself conducting them at the Classical BRIT awards, making a single with Rolf Harris or singing with them on four CDs!"

Ann admits the experience has been unreal at times and something she could have never imagined when she started out in the music business. She won a

scholarship to train at the Royal Academy of Music in London, and while she was there won several other awards. On top of that she has won a string of top competition prizes including firsts at the National Eisteddfod and Llangollen International Eisteddfod. Ann went straight from the Academy to the Scottish National Opera; she sang at Glyndebourne for four years and also sang at Sydney Opera House.

So why did she decide to step down while the choir's reputation was soaring? Ann explained: "I'm a singer as well as a conductor and I'd like to concentrate a little more on my own solo career. Being the choir's soloist has been great but it can be a hard evening when you've 60 men to worry about as well as yourself." Ann will continue as conductor of Côr Meibion Bro Glyndwr, based on Corwen, where she lives, and is artistic director of the North Wales International Music Festival staged each September in St. Asaph. Earlier this year when the National Eisteddfod was in Bala, Ann was inducted into the Bardic Circle. She also chairs the music committee for the 2011 Wrexham National Eisteddfod.
